## A BILL

To require the Secretary of State, in coordination with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, the Administrator of the United States Agency for International Development, and such other heads of departments and agencies as the Secretary of State considers appropriate, to formulate a strategy for the Federal Government to secure support from foreign countries, multilateral organizations, and other appropriate entities to facilitate the development and commercialization of qualified pandemic or epidemic products, and for other purposes.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Saving Us from Pan-
5	demic Era Resistance by Building a Unified Global Strat-
6	egy Act of 2024" or the "SUPER BUGS Act of 2024".
7	SEC. 2. INTERNATIONAL STRATEGY FOR DEVELOPMENT
8	AND COMMERCIALIZATION OF QUALIFIED
9	PANDEMIC OR EPIDEMIC PRODUCTS.
10	(a) Strategy.—
11	(1) In general.—Not later than 540 days
12	after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Sec-
13	retary of State, in coordination with the Secretary of
14	Health and Human Services, the Administrator of
15	the United States Agency for International Develop-
16	ment, and such other heads of departments and
17	agencies as the Secretary of State considers appro-
18	priate, shall—
19	(A) formulate a strategy for the Federal
20	Government to secure support from foreign
21	countries, multilateral organizations, and other
22	appropriate entities to facilitate the develop-
23	ment and commercialization of qualified pan-
24	demic or epidemic products, including such

1	products to address antimicrobial resistant
2	pathogens—
3	(i) with pandemic potential; or
4	(ii) that are priority pathogens; and
5	(B) submit such strategy to the appro-
6	priate committees of Congress.
7	(2) Contents.—The strategy required by
8	paragraph (1) shall—
9	(A) provide for processes the Federal Gov-
10	ernment is using and would use to enter into
11	arrangements with foreign countries, multilat-
12	eral organizations, and other appropriate enti-
13	ties in certain circumstances to implement the
14	strategy;
15	(B) strive to ensure that the arrangements
16	described in subparagraph (A) promote equi-
17	table contributions based on the budgets and
18	technical expertise of participating countries,
19	organizations, and other entities, as appro-
20	priate;
21	(C) focus the arrangements described in
22	subparagraph (A) on global priorities while ena-
23	bling participating countries, organizations, and
24	other entities to emphasize national or regional
25	issues of importance;

1	(D) seek to ensure new and existing ar-
2	rangements described in subparagraph (A) are
3	harmonized with each other and with other rel-
4	evant existing or planned efforts to amplify im-
5	pact, address gaps, prevent duplication of ef-
6	fort, and efficiently distribute funds;
7	(E) provide for collaboration so that the
8	arrangements described in subparagraph (A)—
9	(i) allocate joint or individual respon-
10	sibility across participating countries, orga-
11	nizations, and other entities for the devel-
12	opment and commercialization of par-
13	ticular qualified pandemic or epidemic
14	products; and
15	(ii) describe such collaboration;
16	(F) encourage the stewardship of qualified
17	pandemic or epidemic products developed pur-
18	suant to the strategy;
19	(G) ensure that priority actions are identi-
20	fied in the arrangements described in subpara-
21	graph (A) so that scarce domestic and inter-
22	national funds are allocated to develop and
23	commercialize qualified pandemic or epidemic
24	products that can achieve the greatest positive
25	impact on human health, including unprece-

1	dented approaches to preventing, treating, and
2	diagnosing infectious diseases;
3	(H) consider approaches including—
4	(i) securing development, production,
5	and distribution contracts with the private
6	sector;
7	(ii) entering into public-private part-
8	nerships;
9	(iii) implementing alternative payment
10	models;
11	(iv) creating coverage and reimburse-
12	ment pathways; and
13	(v) streamlining regulatory approval
14	processes; and
15	(I) align with pandemic preparedness and
16	response priorities of the United States, such as
17	those articulated in—
18	(i) the National Strategy for Com-
19	bating Antibiotic-Resistant Bacteria (dated
20	September 2014); and
21	(ii) the National Biodefense Strategy
22	and Implementation Plan (dated October
23	2022) and the associated Action Plan
24	(dated October 2022).

1	(b) Arrangements.—The Secretary of State, in
2	consultation with the Secretary of Health and Human
3	Services, the Administrator of the United States Agency
4	for International Development, and such other heads of
5	departments and agencies as the Secretary of State con-
6	siders appropriate, shall seek to enter into arrangements
7	with foreign countries, multilateral organizations, and
8	other appropriate entities to implement the strategy re-
9	quired by subsection (a).
10	(c) Definitions.—In this section:
11	(1) Appropriate committees of con-
12	GRESS.—The term "appropriate committees of Con-
13	gress' means—
14	(A) the Committee on Foreign Relations
15	and the Committee on Health, Education
16	Labor, and Pensions of the Senate; and
17	(B) the Committee on Foreign Affairs and
18	the Committee on Energy and Commerce of the
19	House of Representatives.
20	(2) Priority Pathogens.—The term "priority
21	pathogens" means pathogens identified in—
22	(A) the latest "Antibiotic Resistance
23	Threats Report' of the Centers for Disease
24	Control and Prevention (or any successor re-
25	port); or

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1	(B) the latest global priority pathogens list
2	or fungal priority pathogens list of the World
3	Health Organization (or any successor list).
4	(3) Qualified pandemic or epidemic prod-
5	UCT.—The term "qualified pandemic or epidemic
6	product" has the meaning given that term in section
7	319F-3(i) of the Public Health Service Act (42
8	U.S.C. 247d–6d(i)).
